

Here are two that I was aware of (there will be others - let your trainer know what they are).

In the agility round, there was a tunnel after the first jump - and Jack ducked under the first jump to run straight to the tunnel. A tunnel after the first jump is a well known trap that will catch out a few dogs not jumping the first jump (because the dog focuses on the tunnel – looking under the jump pole) - and this is something we need to work on with everyone.

Basil suddenly decided he didn't like this strange-looking person (the judge) standing near him in the ring. I'm not sure how many of our members would admit to being 'strange-looking' but we obviously need to do some training with people standing near the equipment so dogs are not put off by a judge in a competition.

Well done to all those who won classes (Belle, Bertie, Blix, Dino, Kia, Loki, Max, Maze, Shade) and also Rory who came second, a great warm up for Crufts, and Sue Rodger with Ella who was the best nursery competitor overall.

I also wanted say how good it was to see Jill Lowe competing now she's recovered from her detached retina. (I liked that she specifically asked if she could run round in a dusty environment - does this sum up indoor agility?)

Although we won, the event and the training opportunities and the opportunities to get to know other members are the important things. The full results are in a separate annexe.

Goal Setting

A few years ago I attended a Sports Psychology for Dog Agility seminar run by Mark Laker. The course was very thought-provoking! It covered the principles of agility psychology and reasons that affect our performance, and ways of overcoming the problems. One of the sessions was to do with goal setting which I have tried to keep up. Taking time to set some goals helps focus your agility training.



When I got Shade (left) I was determined to get the basics right and not try to progress too quickly. We spent a lot of time on groundwork - stays, recalls, send ahead. Once she was nearing 16 months I thought about setting goals. These were very simple at first such as completing an obstacle correctly. At the magic 18 months (when you can compete at KC shows) she was not doing full height jumps, a seesaw or weaves in a straight line.

We all want different things from agility. Some are competitive, some are not. This article may make you think about how you address agility whatever your point of view.

Think how your dog has progressed at agility over the last year or past few months for dogs newer to agility. Will your dog wait at the start; will they go on ahead of you; complete contacts successfully?

Now think about what you want to achieve with your dogs over the next few months your goals. The criteria for goal setting (SCCAMP) are:

| Specific – e.g. Get 12 points in UKA Performance rounds as compared to 'some' points. |
|---|
| Controllable - Not dependent on others. |
| Challenging – e.g. If your dog has already got 9 points in UKA Performance and you specify 12 points the goal above would not be challenging! |
| Attainable – If you are a Grade 1 competitor setting your goal for Grade 2 (compared with Grade 7) is realistic. |
| Measurable - Not vague - so you know when they are achieved. |
| Personal – Relating to you so goals may be different depending on your outlook on agility. |
| suggestions for your goals depending on the level you are at: |
| Successfully complete the seesaw as part of a course (e.g. jump, seesaw, jump) |
| Weaves in a straight line. |
| Run my dog at a Wallingford demo. |
| Compete in a nursery event at a UKA show. |
| Wait at start with 1 jump lead out. |
| Wait at start with another dog on the course |
| A top 10 place at a KC show |
| |

Think about how you can achieve these goals i.e. if you want to run your dog at a Wallingford demo find out when and where they are and arrange to attend one. If you want to run at a KC show for the first time arrange to get your dog measured. You may benefit from an external training course. A variety of training events are listed at agilitynet.co.uk/clutch/events.htm.

Get a diary specifically for your agility. I find two pages to a week is suitable. Think about your training session. Were there things you had difficulty with but were able to resolve? Draw a sketch of this part of the course. Write down what you couldn't do and how you resolved the problem. If this was a big issue highlight it.

Perhaps you couldn't sort the problem straight away but there were things you could continue to work on until your next training session. Write these down shortly after your lesson or the

next day if possible. You don't need to record the whole lesson just a couple of things that were beneficial or that were specifically helpful to you.

Aim to have three to five goals. Write them down. Then go back and look at them again. Do they meet the SCCAMP criteria above? If necessary rewrite them.

After a month look at your goals. Are there any you can tick off? Have you made progress with any of the others e.g. If your target was to do a jump, seesaw are you now able to do the seesaw on its own? If not, then look at the goals again. Are they too challenging? Are they specific and measurable? If you've achieved all your goals perhaps they weren't challenging enough so set some new goals.

Keeping a diary helps you keep track of your achievements and also problem areas. Look back through the months. You may be amazed at what you and your dog have achieved. I find this helps me remember things I may have forgotten! I'm not very good at using a stop hand – I tend to use the whole arm but I should be bending my arm at the elbow! Seeing this in writing is a good reminder.

On the Wallingford Wiki website wdtc.wetpaint.com on the Training Classes page after the lists of the classes there is a table which is for you to enter your aims and improvements you want to make. There is also a chance for the instructor to enter some feedback. Contact lan for an invitation to the site.

Make your goals realistic for the level you are at but challenging to you. You want to be successful but achieve something worthwhile. Make them specific so you know you have obtained them.

I have always enjoyed agility whatever level my dog was at but I tended to drift from one show to another without reviewing our performance – just recalling perhaps we had a missed contact or a refusal. Having no goals meant I was just 'hoping' rather than working towards an outcome. Having goals means you are thinking more about 'why' that happened and 'how' to correct it. Having goals means you are able to measure your achievements.

I am very lucky to have a very talented dog. One of my goals for last year was to get a top 5 place in a Novice Agility Olympia qualifier. I achieved this the last

weekend we were eligible to run in Novice! So then I set another goal for the semi final – not to be eliminated! Fortunately this saw us through to Olympia itself where our goal was just to have fun!

Qualifiers for Grades 1 and 2

Check the rules for each show for exact qualifying criteria as it sometimes changes from year to year and according to dog height.

Agility Club Starters Challenge

Each heat consists of a G1-2 agility course from which the 1st & 2nd place AGILITY CLUB MEMBERS from each heat qualify for the final. The final is held on Saturday evening at Agility Club's July show at Ardingly. Some nice crystal on offer! Heats at:

Each heat consists of a G1-2 agility course from which the two go through to the finals. For the first time in 2012 the finals were held in their own show. Prizes included nice crystal and free food for all qualifiers. Heats at:

Anyone in G1 or G2 with a top 10 place throughout the year, or 50 Agility Warrant points (check rules for dates) can enter the heats held on the Friday of the KC Festival (August). The top 30 combined scores from Agility and Jumping rounds go through to the Semi's on the Saturday. The top 12 in the semi's go to Discover Dogs at Earls Court in November for the final.

Comlimanor Starters Cup

Heats at Kernow, March and Thames, June +8 others. First 6 places in each heat qualify for final at Tuffley, July 2013

Omni-Pro Starters Cup

No info on 2013 heats available

Winners get a large bag of dog food and qualify for final at Lansdown in June.

Drontal Challenge

Open to G1-3 large dogs. The top five competitors from each of the eight heats will be invited to compete at The Drontal Agility Challenge Grand Final on Sunday, 29 September 2013 at the Malvern Autumn Show. Heats at:

In it to win it! Or points make prizes!

Have you heard these expressions before? Well it is so true of our own club competition. We are heading up towards our AGM when some very special – nay clever – nay fast – nay consistent – owner/dog combination will be presented with a club award. Who will it/they be this year? Come to the AGM and find out!

You mean you didn't know that there is a club competition? Let me tell you how you too can enter. On the Wiki there is a tab called 'Boasts'. It is what it says it is - a place where you can enter all your positive runs at any competition you enter. So if you go to a KC, UKA or independent show and you get a clear round or, better still, a place, then we would love to hear about it and would love to see your 'boast' on the Wiki. From the 'Boasts' tab, click on the relevant year (that would be 2013 now!) and type in your boast under the name of the show – don't be afraid – but if in doubt then let me know and I will willingly help!

Okay – boast registered, but how is then turned into points. On the main 'Boasts' page, if you scroll down to the bottom, there is an Excel spreadsheet which it is possible to download (you will need to download it, suggest to your desktop screen, to add information – and then re-load it once completed!). If you click on this and open it you will find a list of dogs and owners. Dogs and handlers are put into one of 4 categories – juniors (under 17 years of age) Starters (new to agility or the equivalent KC grade 1/2), Novice (KC grades 3-5) and Senior (KC grades 6/7) and the chance to enter your boast to be turned into points.

If you are not yet included on the spreadsheet let me know and I can arrange for you to be added – everyone should get themselves onto the spreadsheet. Once you are on the spreadsheet then the information you will need to enter is whether it was agility or jumping, your place or CR (clear round) and the number of dogs that were entered in your class. The spreadsheet will do the rest. If this is too daunting, or you would like some assistance – then let either Karen Parker or myself know and we will help. With so many great new dogs and handlers the competition is getting hotter – 2012 may be decided, but could you be on the list for recognition at our 2013/14 AGM?

We will start the new season for points after the March AGM – just in time for the start of all those UKA shows, Easter and of course our own show. Good luck everyone!

Going to a Show this year?

If you are going to start competing, then consider this. There are a number of leagues you might be eligible for.

Did you know that if you are a member of Agility Club, you can enter your points into their league – any 1st – 10th place (or clear rounds) gained at a KC show, and, if you have registered you are a Wallingford member, then your points are included in the inter club league.

There is an annual fee to become a member of the Agility Club (not too much), and this gives you access to a monthly magazine, reduced entry to the Agility Club KC show in July, as well as eligibility for the Agility Club Starters (G1-2) challenge cup. [Ed's note – see Jo's article on G1-2 qualifiers]

If you want to check out more then go to www.agilityclub.org where you will find a better explanation of the benefits of becoming a member – but remember to put Wallingford as your club – look up the Club league – there are only 5 dogs submitting points to our club - well done Alison, Kevin and Jill L (and me!) Who else can/could/should be submitting points? We are in Division 2 and sitting 9 th but surely we have the dogs and results to be doing better than that!

Other leagues that might be of interest to you – there are a goodly number of rescue dogs at Wallingford, so consider entering the Agility Rescue Dog League. Others include Gun Dog League; Lurcher League; Agility Terrier League – or if you are an old 'git' like me then there is a league for the over '55's' (and that's handlers!) – Senior Agility League (SAL).

More information of some of the leagues available to you can be found at www.agilitynet.com – scroll down the home page and you will find a section headed 'Leagues'



A lot of these leagues (except Agility Club) allow you to include wins and clear rounds from shows other than KC – it can be worth it. 2011 saw my dog Rockett gaining a lovely crystal vase for coming 2nd in G1 Agility Club League (*left*) and then two lovely gifts for wins in the SAL – 1st in the Ruby section and an amazing 1st overall. This year Robert Tappin's boy Glen (Ozzie's brother) won the league set up for Rosmarinus dogs and their offspring – well done Glen.

You will be amazed how your points can add up if you are entering shows and I will look forward to seeing others 'boasting' of their achievements. Good luck everyone.

All members will be considered for teams provided the dog / handler are able to complete a course with all the equipment likely to be in the competition.

The Wiki is still to be updated for other 2013 shows but the WDTC team page is ready for names to be added - the rest will be updated in due course.
