The club uses the profit we make from running the show to purchase equipment and help pay for training workshops. So far this year we have done both. Lee Gibson is

one of the country's top handlers and he also trains agility across the world so I was really pleased that he agreed to run a workshop for us in February. We have also had Anthony Clarke - another top handler and international trainer - training classes on a Thursday evening. Each trainer we have brings suggestions of different techniques and handling methods - something for everyone. But there are a few common threads and one that crops up again and again is giving your dog time (and teaching him to recognise your handling) to gather itself and jump short when a turn immediately follows a jump. It might look fast when a dog charges round a course, but jumping long over a jump just before a turn can waste seconds. So this year - learn to 'shape' a turn so that your dog can power up the straights, but gather itself and turn tightly round a jump wing when necessary.

The committee had been considering renewing the leaking container in which we store the agility equipment for some time now and eventually the deed has been done. With thanks to everyone who helped out - we now have a new, dry container, complete with doors that close

easily, a ramp for the trolley and racking for the planks.

Competition nights are important when we train on short exercises - handlers and dogs have to get used to running up to 20 obstacles in one go. However, members were getting a bit fed up with competition nights at the end of every course. So the plan is to hold fewer of them - but make them more significant. Members were invited to attend for the whole evening for the one held in March, which gave everyone a chance to do both a jumping and an



agility course. Everyone seemed to enjoy the evening. The scoring below is for everyone who did not get eliminated. The top 5 in each class scored points – the overall position was taken from the aggregate. Thanks, as ever, to everyone who helped.

CANINE TETANUS

I have to Thank Jenny Lovegrove for this article, a sad tale with a happy ending and a cautionary theme. First the scientific bit as the bimbos in the shampoo ads say!

Types

There are two types. Localized tetanus causes rigidity in a focused area of the dog's 1 body. The other is generalized tetanus, which causes all-over symptoms and eventually affects all areas of the animal's body. (Guv has the generalized tetanus) Symptoms

2.

Tetanus bacteria create a toxin, which affects the nervous system and produces muscle spasms. The dog's jaw can become "locked" by these spasms, creating the condition known as lockjaw. Early on, ears will become erect, and movement becomes difficult. Lateterm symptoms can move to vital systems, making breathing and other processes difficult. Causes

The bacterium is introduced through a wound in the dog. A powerful toxin targets the 3. neuromuscular junction--the area between the dog's nerve and muscle--and creates the recognizable muscle stiffness in sufferers.

Incubation

4 The time it takes between exposure to the bacteria and display of symptoms ranges from between two days to two months. Most often, symptoms will begin within fourteen days of initial injury.

Treatment

5. If found early on, veterinarians can administer an antitoxin, antibiotic or muscle relaxer to help symptoms subside. In more advanced cases, supportive care to help with respiratory problems or other side effects may become necessary as a purely palliative approach. Prognosis

Tetanus is rare in dogs, but if it is caught early enough and care is provided, most ani-6. mals will recover. If the bacteria goes unchecked for too long, the toxin may have spread too far to treat effectively.

...and now Guvnor's story as told by his Mum Jenny

We first noticed something was wrong with our little man Thursday 14th January, he seemed to have a bit of a snuffle in his nose and as there was kennel cough about I phoned the vet to ask if it could be the start of this, she said it was possible and let them know if he started to cough. The next day it was worse so I took him to see the vet in the evening, he checked him over thoroughly and gave him an injection of antibiotics and told



me he should improve by the morning. We had a bad night with Guv his breathing was getting worse he didn't have co-ordination his face and eyes had changed shape we were really worried, we phoned the main surgery Saturday morning (15th) they told us to bring him straight in, our vet Stephen Masters saw him and within minutes told us the devastating news that he had tetanus, he had treated only two dogs in about 15 or so years of practice, it is thankfully a very rare condition in dogs as they have a natural immunity, that is why there is no vaccine for them, we thank God that Stephen was on duty as the other vets had never seen a dog with tetanus so probably they may not have started treatment so early on. Guv was put in their intensive care on a drip with all the medication required, we had to leave him there and wait at home for the vet to phone us later in the evening, we dreaded the phone ringing as we were praying that it wasn't bad news, when we got the call it was to tell us that Guv was do-ing as well as expected, and we could phone them in the morning.

Sunday Guv no worse but still very poorly, we went to see him to let him know we hadn't abandoned him, Stephen had to catheterise him as he couldn't empty his bladder, we managed to hand feed him tiny bits of food.

Monday went to visit him, managed to take him outside carrying his drip he was panting very heavily and it was like he was encased in a suit of Armour, so distressing to see him like it but we were encouraged that he was fighting well. Tuesday vet phoned us to say he was taking Guv off the drip to see if he will drink on his own, if he drank a litre of water in 24 hours then we might be able to bring him home, this was a step forward and good news.

Wednesday vet phoned to say he could come home, we picked him up in the morning with loads of tablets and instructions, he was still needing to be hand fed and was still very stiff. Later that evening he had a spasm which was like a massive fit, we weren't prepared as we weren't told this could happen, he was to have many more especially through the night so we had to contain him in a small room off of our bedroom where we could see and hear him, we had quite a few sleepless nights because of these, also as the poor little lad was completely incontinent we had to put sheets down all over the floors, I was constantly washing them and vet bedding, but a small price to pay as he was home with us and slowly improving.

Thursday same as Wednesday no change. Friday had a check up saw a different vet and she was very pleased with him and thought we were coping well. He actually managed to pick up his favourite fluffy football and giving it to us to roll across the floor, also managing to eat more food with his tablets crushed into it as he still finds it difficult to chew and swallow properly.

Saturday still improving stiffness gradually easing and his eyes look a bit more focused, still incontinent also drools a lot which is one of the symptoms, he sometimes bites his tongue so drools blood also which looks awful, am constantly wiping his mouth. Sunday and Monday still improving but still very restless at night.


Tuesday took him to see Stephen for a further check up, he was very pleased and said what a difference to when he last saw him he expects him to make a full recovery-FANTAS-TIC NEWS. No need for any further check ups either.

Wednesday Guv can now jump up on to the sofa, he is eating full size meals but we have to fork it up for him, can manage soft treats too. Taking him for two 20 minute walks a day and notice he is walking less like a robot bless him.

Thursday and Friday great improvement have taken sheets up as no need for them, he is asking to go outside now what seems like every 10 minutes as he is getting more feeling back, also able to trot and run about now, feeding him his normal dried food without having to soak

it, also managing biscuits and eyes more focused.

Saturday best day yet, everything has improved and although there is still some stiffness he is looking so much better and almost normal. We reckon in a couple of weeks he might be able to start doing a bit of training, he learns really quickly so hopefully he won't have forgotten all the months of foundation training we did last year. Derek and I once again thank our wonderful family and friends for all the support they have given us through a really bad time.
