# **Changes to the Dangerous Dogs Act - Advice for Owners**

The amended Dangerous Dogs Act came into effect in England and Wales on 13 May 2014. This law applies to all dog owners no matter what size or breed, whether your pet is a Chihuahua, a Cockapoo or a Collie cross.

# Which elements of the existing Dangerous Dogs Act should dog owners be aware of?

Section 3 of the Act applies to every single dog owner in England and Wales. Under this section, it is a criminal offence for the person in charge of the dog to allow it to be 'dangerously out of control' in a public place.



A dog doesn't have to bite to be deemed dangerous in the eyes of the law

Generally if a dog bites a person, it will be presumed to have been 'dangerously out of control', however even if the dog does not bite, but gives the person grounds to feel that the dog may injure them, the law still applies.

Not many dog owners are aware of this, and it is important to hold that thought when looking at the changes.

#### What's changed?

While owners need to be fully aware of all the changes, the biggest difference from now on is the Act also covers incidents on private property in addition to public spaces. This includes your own house and both front and back gardens.

In addition:

- It will now be an offence for your dog to attack an assistance dog (Guide Dog, Hearing Dog etc).
- Prison sentences will be increased for those convicted of some offences
- Police or an appointed local authority now have powers to seize a dangerously out of control dog in a private place. The existing legislation already covers public places.

#### What should dog owners be doing now?

#### Ensure your gardens are safe

The most important point to consider is how to keep unexpected visitors or delivery drivers safe on your property. The requirement for the law to cover private places as well as public ones has long been campaigned for by the Communication Workers Union. Numerous Royal Mail and other delivery services employees are injured by dog bites each year and up until now there has not been the legislation to enable action to be taken to ensure their future safety.

You need to make sure that any visitor can safely access your front door without encountering your dog.

There is a slight grey area in these changes in that if the person attacked is a burglar or trespasser your dog may not be considered dangerously out of control if it is in a building that is your private dwelling at the time of the attack. However, this does not cover incidents in your

back or front garden so while the law is yet to be tested, all dog owners should ensure that all areas of their gardens where their dogs could encounter unexpected visitors are secure.

If necessary it is also worth talking to your neighbours and asking them not to let their children climb your fences to retrieve balls etc to be on the safe side.

#### Manage your dog when someone knocks

We all know that fewer letters are being sent through the post, but the rise in internet shopping means that more parcels and especially signed for parcels are being delivered, which requires the delivery person to knock at the door. This change in legislation should be a wake up call to all dog owners to ensure their dogs are under control when they open the door otherwise they risk committing a criminal offence.



It is not unusual for a dog to be reactive to any visitor to your door, so you need to decide now how you are going to manage that situation. The easiest thing to do is to shut your dog in another room or in the garden, provided of course the dog cannot access the front door from the garden. If that is not an option, then you will need to seek the services of an experienced or qualified dog trainer or behaviourist to teach your dog some new behaviours around the door.

You also need to consider how your dog greets people. What you view as a dog being friendly

by jumping up at visitors may be seen as threatening behaviour by a stranger.

Owning a dog is a huge responsibility and should not be taken lightly, however by taking some time to think about what these changes mean to you and your dog, you will be taking steps to keep everyone safe and avoid ending up in a position that no one wants to find themselves in.

# **Agility Terrier League**

The Terrier League was started last year by Hannah 'Spana' Grantham, who decided that as terriers were so notorious difficult to run in agility that they deserved their own league to compete against each other. Just like the DARL league you enter your agility wins throughout the year and at the end of the year get presented with an award if you are one of the top achieving terriers.

On Saturday 21<sup>st</sup> June the very first Agility Terrier League final was held at the Dog Vegas show at Thetford. The top achieving dogs from different grades were invited to compete in the final. In the terrier league all dogs compete at their own height but they are also competing time wise against the other heights too. There were lots of small terriers, quite a few medium and just 1 large!

The finals for the terrier league took place in the evening after all the rings had finished so everyone could relax and watch the finals. The dogs compete at the grade they were in a year

ago, so my terrier, Bertie was competing in the grade 1-4's. As there were lots of grade 1-4

dogs and not so many grade 5-7 there was just 1 agility course for grade 1-7. Rosettes were given for overall places and then the top grade 5-7 dog was awarded the 'Grade 5-7 champion terrier' and top grade 1-4 dog was awarded the 'Grade 1-4 champion terrier'.

Bertie had been injured and limping just over a week before the finals so I was really worried he might not be able to compete but Bertie showed me how delighted he was to be competing again by shooting around the course like a rocket and getting all his contacts! There was one worrying moment when he shot into the weaves so quickly that he hit a weave pole and was almost thrown out of the weaves, but he made a quick recovery and got a huge cheer as he crossed the finish!



The overall results were read out and Bertie got a  $4^{th}$  overall. i.e.  $4^{th}$  out of all the grade 1-7 dogs but he was the fastest grade 1-4 terrier so was presented the rosette and prize for Agility Terrier League 2014 grade 1 – 4 champion! We will also be getting a portrait of our Bertie as part of the award.

# Hairy Harri of Valgrays

Who believes in fate? Or that if it's meant to be, it will happen? Well, this is the story of Sky / Colin / Harri...

Val Phillips (Valgrays Border Collie rescue) starts the story... "In February we spotted a picture in the death hole of Petrosani PS (dog shelter in Romania), a black and white dog, looking through the bars... We put him on the list and brought him to Bucharest along with another boy called Casey. When the car arrived late at night, I realised that Casey was Casey but the other one looked a little bit different, same black-white but more black on his forehead... It was a different dog from the one we chose. So Sky came to us by surprise and by pure chance, being taken out "by happy mistake" from the same PS. We could not locate the first dog we chose, we still search for him... But that was the beginning of Sky's chance of a new life in the UK".

Meanwhile in the UK I had started looking for another young rescue. As everyone knows I like scruffy dogs. Wendy tried hard – but nothing was quite right. I searched many rescue websites – but none of the dogs were quite right. I was interested in Honeypot (a Valgrays rescue) but she was spoken for, so that was not to be. I fostered a lovely pup from Many Tears – a Beardie x Springer. She was fabulous – easy going, fun and clever and she was quickly snapped up by Beverley Cuddy (editor of Dogs Today) to join her Beardie and Springer (she's now called Betty and often gets a mention in the magazine). I noticed that Betty's brother was still at Many Tears – so put in to foster him – with a view to maybe keeping him if he was as nice a pup as Betty had been. But on the day before we were to pick him up – he was reserved. That also was not to be.

Back with Sky, and lots of work to get his pet passport, then a long journey back to the UK, along with a few other lucky dogs. Once at Valgray's he settled down and started enjoying life. Sky became Colin as Val already had a Sky. I spotted Colin and he was JUST the sort of dog I

liked – big & scruffy. I enquired about him but an owner was lined up for him. Obviously not meant for me.

However, sadly the man had a sudden health problem so they felt that they couldn't take on Colin – so he came up for adoption again, and would be at Easter Celebration on the Saturday. When Val first got Sky/Colin out of the van he was really spooked, and I did worry about that – I didn't want a nervous dog. But he settled down with our pack, and to be honest – I had just fallen in love.

#### So - this WAS meant to be!

Life with Harri is – interesting! For example he climbed into the apple tree (the pigeon he chased flew off); he paddled in the pond, then dug in the border (he has very large feet, which were FILTHY) then played chase through the house with Dino; what a mess!



He's very wary of new things, so it took 10 minutes just throwing titbits into a tunnel until he felt comfortable enough to go through – after which he was running through very happily (thanks Lee). He and Dino went swimming in the fast-flowing river at Catton Hall – paddling furiously upstream and getting nowhere. Dino managed to get into the side – then to my horror Harri turned round and started swimming downstream. As it happened, that was the most sensible thing to do – he was able to swim into the bank where I caught him.

He does chase things (he put up a pheasant, then chased it across the exercise area and through the rings at Catton Hall – luckily early in the morning before the rings had started). I'm working hard on his recall. I was surprised when this great big hairy boy anxiously hovered in the hallway on his first training class (Alison's Wag & Tone sessions) but he saw that Darcy was enjoying herself and after 10 minutes decided to give it a try. Clicker training is great for anxious dogs as it is a 'hands off' training method – and Harri loves learning new stuff for his click & treats.

Yes – he's a fab boy (just look at those gorgeous eyes!) and we're going to have some fun!

Just a quick note about why the UK is importing rescue dogs from Romania. This has been happening since the president of Romania announced his desire to slaughter all stray dogs across Romania and subsequently had a bill passed in order to



accomplish this in September 2013. Since then, across the country rescue centres have been trying to save as many stray dogs as possible, working with rescue centres in the UK to export as many dogs as possible to where they know will be good homes. Petrosani Dog Shelter is no exception and Val Phillips works with them to rescue as many as possible, and I'm very grateful for all their hard – and emotional - work.

On a very cold December day, my van engine seized and I had to coast onto the hard shoulder of the motorway. After getting myself and my dogs up the embankment to safety, I had plenty of time to think about the hazards of travelling up and down the country with my dogs whilst I was waiting for the breakdown services.

My van is custom-caged for my eight dogs so when the breakdown truck arrived although I wasn't exactly happy about my dogs being in the van on a flat bed recovery vehicle. At least I knew they were contained, safe and warm - and I was only a couple of feet away from them in the cab.

Imagine how different this scene would be if I'd have been involved in an accident rather than just a breakdown!

- What would happen to my dogs if I was taken to hospital?
- What would or could the emergency services do?
- Who would they call?
- Would my breakdown provider still be prepared to move my vehicle with my dogs inside without me there and what would happen to my dogs if they did?



There were far too many unanswered questions for my liking! This made me determined to design something for friends, family and my Racingredd Agility members to keep in their vehicles.
