A BIG thank you to members of the Wallingford Dog Training Club for our lovely agility jump (see Dino trying it out for size).



We joined WDTC (then at Silverdown riding centre in Harwell) around 1990 to do agility; me with a silver standard poodle - Roxy, and Ian with an Aussie - Digger. Agility was very different in those days — trotting round with your dog on your left. I recall a training session when we started to run with our dog on the right; jumps were put up against the wall of the Blewbury school and we ran them in a straight line with the dog on our right (strange for both dogs and handlers). Weaves were taught by walking alongside the dog, stepping into the dog to 'push' them away through alternate poles. Jumps were higher then — and no small & medium heights - and A-frames were higher and steeper.

Some of the members in those early days (not all with their current partners!) included Mark (who was chairman when we joined) & Karen Laker, Lorna & Simon Peachey, Rosemary & Robert Tappin, Sue & Tom Cuddon, Jill Lowe, Gill Kimber and José Rostagni. Then there were the youngsters, including Simon Tappin, Tanya Cooper, Jenny Kimber, Annette Lowe & Tasha Wise.

We took our dogs to the obedience section (on a Wednesday evening) run by José, then Rosemary & Sue, who helped pioneer the Kennel Club Good Citizen Scheme). We helped out with the training, and eventually took over running that section. One of the highlights was to have the Blue Peter dog Mabel join Sue's class for training with its

owner, then take the Good Citizen test with presenter Katy Hill. The local dog warden visited to test the class, and (thankfully) Mabel and Katy passed! (At about the same time WDTC appeared on another children's TV programme when Rosie & Jim stepped off their barge to have a go at dog agility.)

Motherhood, relocation, motherhood and new hobbies took several trainers away and the Good Citizen section closed. We both held positions on the Club committee, covering just about all the roles – except treasurer. And continued agility training with subsequent dogs, some more successful (lan's dogs Stig, Dash, Dino & Darcey) than others (Jacky's dogs Inky, Lazer, Kip & Harri).



The club and its members have been a significant part of our lives for around a quarter of a century and we have made a huge number of friends. We wish the club and all its current members a happy and successful future — and end with another thank-you for the jump. If any of you are up Lincolnshire way, do come and see us.

Helping at Wallingford Agility Show

Each year the club runs a two day agility show at Newbury Showground (in this context show

means competition not display). This is a VERY important event for the club as financially, the show pays for new equipment and helps towards training days etc. But more importantly it is our chance to offer a lovely friendly, well run show for people to enter.

This year the show takes place over the weekend of **22nd and 23rd April** – please put this date in your diary if you haven't already! All club members are asked to come and help out, any time from 8am till about 5pm.



If you are a beginner who started training recently then you will not be able to enter your dog this year, but it is a brilliant opportunity to see what you are aiming for, learn how competitions work, and get to know your fellow club members. Don't worry if you have never helped at an agility competition before, you will be buddied up with someone who will show you what to do, and we also supply food and drink all day long in return for your hard work.

We also need help on the two days before the show. On Thursday afternoon we mark out the camping spaces. This is over 200 spaces which need a little L to show where each of the corners are. This is a team job as we have a pre-marked rope and everyone moves in formation down the showground, marking as we go!

On the Friday there are lots of jobs to do and we need helpers all day. This is really all hands on deck to get ready. The agility rings have to be marked out (last year we had 11), the courses for Saturday set up, the score tents put up, campers directed to their pitches, the marquee organised, ring boxes and refreshments prepared for Saturday... and a thousand other things I have probably forgotten. Everyone who helps on Friday also gets fed!

Rowan: 10th September 2000 – 6th November 2016

I Did It My Way

Rowan arrived at 10 weeks old, a very small bundle of black fluff, looking for all the world like a baby hedgehog! Ashley fell in love with her straight away (as did we all) and from that moment on they were inseparable.



Rowan was quite a shy little girl, and didn't really enjoy her puppy classes. In fact she spent the entire 8 week course sitting mainly behind my legs! Not a good omen for a budding agility dog?

Things went better when she was old enough to go to proper agility training, and as long as she wasn't expected to interact with anyone she was fine, and seamed to quite enjoy it. I can remember Jacky saying one day that she was faster than Ashley!

Unfortunately she seemed to lose a bit of confidence in the ring. She always got a clear round and was quite good and steady in a team. Later, she lost confidence on the seesaw. Partly through being pushed to do it when she didn't want to, and partly, as I found out later, because of a problem with her sight.

Rowan was diagnosed with Progressive Retinal Atrophy when she was 7 years old. The vet said to keep her out of bright light, but that she would go blind within a couple of years. I'm sure many of you can remember Rowan sporting a pair of very snazzy doggles! She took to them straight away, and the UV filters in them preserved her sight for many more years. She couldn't see in bright light at all, so agility was confined to cloudy days.

I remember one show when she was about 10. It was a bit bright and I told the judge, she wouldn't be able to see so we would go round very slowly. Rowan had other ideas and on the command "over" jumped every obstacle and did the tunnels beautifully, even managing 12 weaves. She was a bit slow, but got a respectable clear round. Later that day the Judge gave her a special rosette, and with a tear in her eye said "This little dog is what agility is all about. She is never going to win anything as she can hardly see, but she



has such trust in her handler that she did it anyway." I must admit that it was one of my proudest moments.

Rowan retired at 12 and still enjoyed coming to shows to support Martha and Magnus. She



loved the caravan and was usually seen sitting in the front window on a cushion. Always the lady. Her nickname was "The Duchess".

She was a very special little girl and although she was quiet and shy she had a very strong will. You could never make her do anything she didn't want to do, and sometimes on a walk she would just stop dead and refuse to move. Good job she was small, as after that she had to be carried the rest of the way.

She was very clever in her own quiet way and seemed to know stuff. My daughter always said that if we knew what Rowan was thinking we would be afraid! She had a way of looking right into you as if willing you to understand.

It was with great sadness that I had to say goodbye to her during a prolonged fit that she had no hope of recovering from. Sleep tight special girl, we all miss you. xx
