



The points for each team were added up, and one of the middle scores was dropped from the teams with six members. This gave the total jumping points for each team - and a team order. The top jumping team (yellow) was awarded 12 scoring points, second team (red) 10 scoring points - down to 4 scoring points for teams blue & orange who ended up in joint 5th place with 85 points each. We did a similar thing for the fun tunnel game, getting the average time by dividing the total time by the number in the team. However, to weight it less than the jumping



course we allocated half the scoring points that the jumping class had, so 6 scoring points were awarded to the red team who were top, 5 scoring points to green who were second, 4 scoring points to orange, etc. The final table looks like this:



Merlin had an impressive time in Starter (but is one of those rather impetuous dogs – fast, but inconsistent; when he gets it right – it'll be awesome) with Daisy a steadier clear. It was good seeing the juniors putting on a good show against the adults.

What was your favourite part of the day?


- R. Stealing sweets from Ant

K9 Rehabilitation Massage

Hi this is Joanne from K9 Rehabilitation, I met some of your team at Dizzy Dogs Day and I treat Kia and Worzel (Tania's pooches). I am a qualified canine massage therapist with a clinic in Bicester. I am qualified in 4 different disciplines of massage; Swedish, sports, deep tissue and myofascial release.

As your dogs are athletes it's important to keep them in tip top shape and massage can help to prevent muscular injuries, or deal with them before they become a problem.



I also have dogs on my books who are disabled (wheels, amputees), cruciate ops, patella surgery, orthopaedic conditions such as hip dysplasia even down to the everyday pets or agility/flyball/working dogs who need maintenance massage to keep them performing at their best.

Results are usually seen within 1-3 sessions if the issue is muscular. Please give me a call or drop me an email if you have any questions. I look forward to hearing from you!

Wallingford Teams during the 2012 season

Over 2012 there were 3 different types of Team qualifiers that the club entered one or more team.

CRUFTS Team Agility Competition

This competition is an agility competition for 4 dogs, run as a relay with baton changes. Separate competitions are held for large, medium or small dogs. The heats during 2012 are for the final to be held at Crufts March 2013

Wallingford competed at Tunbridge in May. The team had been drawn to run first & we only just managed run it at all as we'd lost Blix due to injury, and had to run a reserve. Unfortunately that



reserve, Max, had his handler already running in the team so Ian stepped in to help out. He made a good attempt of running Carolyn's young Ollie, until Ollie felt the need to find his Mum

At the Lansdown show in June, we had just one team entered Carolyn & Ollie, me & Cass, Jo & Pip and Gill & Shade. All but Cass regularly train with Lorna Peachey and as she was watching they were on their best behaviour. We achieved a good fast time, and a total of just 15 faults giving us 7th place.

At the Agility Club in July we managed to get two teams together, however we were unable to improve on our Lansdown performance. Well done to Carolyn with Ollie, who was the only clear out of all 8 dogs; 5 dogs managed to get eliminated.

Team Dash - "Chase the Ace"

The Dash style team competition has been running for several years under various sponsors. The common factor is that the course should be a jumping course that is flowing. Most do not include weaves but they are not excluded by the rules so they are included sometimes. Teams of large, medium or small dogs compete against each other under normal agility rules where the winner is the quickest team with the fewest faults.

For 2012 this event gained a new sponsor and became the Dog Vegas "Chase the Ace". We started back in April at our own show with no less than six teams entered - four large, one medium & one small. As is often the case in these teams our best result was by the smalls who all went clear, well done to Jose & Pera, Pam & Martha, Lin & Mozzie & Tania & Worzel. Unusually their time was not quite good enough for a place. The medium team collected a few faults and all the large teams collected at least one elimination.

We had two large teams entered at Golden Valley & one at Caerphilly shows. I was not at either, but understand the results were not brilliant. For Golden Valley unfortunately there were only 3 dogs available for the medium team so they couldn't run.

At the Wye Valley the one team entered managed quite a large number faults, Aileen and Ozzie had the best round with just one pole down.

UKA Team Tournament - Agility

This is a competition for 3 dogs of any heights. The dogs run an individual agility course and a team relay course which includes an A Frame & 12 weaves.

In 2012 we only managed to enter one team in one qualifier. This was the Ajax show in September. The team shared eliminations evenly. In the individual runs, Cass & I, & Gill and Shade went clear with Martha including an extra jump. Then we ran in the relay, I started with a nice clear, until I passed the baton to Pam and let Cass continue over an extra jump and so my E, Martha went clear then, with the pressure off Shade finished by making up the course rather than following the numbers.

2013.....

....Will be the year we are going to qualify!! Once the schedules start coming out let me know (via the Wiki or email if possible please) if you want to be included in a team & it could be YOU who is part of a qualified team. If we can organise it I will try to enter the same teams as far as possible.


Measuring dogs for agility

In agility dogs of different heights jump obstacles appropriate to their size. Different organisations run agility shows in this area, and they have different rules for measuring dogs.

The Kennel Club

Our club is affiliated to the Kennel Club and there are KC licensed shows throughout the country and throughout the year. ALL dogs have to be measured before they compete at a KC licensed show and before they are measured they must be registered with the KC, either

on the breed or activity register.



Each dog needs an Agility Record Book (*left*) to record its measurement which needs to be available with the dog when it is measured. These books cost £1.50 from the Kennel Club online shop or sometimes from the measurers. The club sometimes has copies you could purchase.

We always recommend that dogs are microchipped, and this number should be on the Agility Record Book to enable the measurers to check that the correct dog is measured (the measurers will scan for the microchip number). A dog without a microchip will need to have a photograph (showing any distinctive marking) affixed to the record book. Measuring is carried out by two Kennel Club approved measurers — either at a measuring session, or at many of the KC shows.



Dogs are measured while they stand on a flat surface, such as a table, into one of three sizes using a hoop (above) which sits on the dog's withers (shoulders):

Height name	Dog's height	Height of jumps
Large	over 43cms (1ft 5ins),	65cms
medium	over 35cms (1ft 1.75ins) and 43cms or under	45cms
Small	35cms or under.	35cms

If a dog is obviously large (clearly over 43cms) it may be measured prior to 15 months of age. All other dogs must be at least 15months old. If the measurers (with the handler's approval) believe that a dog is obviously large then a second measurement is not necessary and the record book will be marked as such.

A dog that just measures into large and all small & medium dogs must be measured twice, and the second measurement must be made between 12 and 24 months after their initial measure by two different measurers. If the second measurement differs from the first, a third measurement is required, and the result of the third measurement will stand. The third measurement, which must be made within 2 calendar months of the second measurement, must be made by two measurers who have not measured the dog before. The cost of measuring a dog is £4.

UKA

UK Agility is an organisation which runs independent shows in this area. All registered dogs are measured for free at UKA shows. All dogs must be measured by a judge or approved UKA measurer to determine the dog's jump height at or before their first show unless they are competing at the Maxi height. To receive a permanent jump height measurement, dogs must either be competing at the Maxi jump height or must be two years of age for their permanent measurement.

Dogs will be measured using official measuring devices while the dog is placed in a standing position on a flat surface such as a table. The measurement is taken from the perpendicular line from the top of the dog's withers to the flat surface.

At the time of measuring, the measurement will be recorded and sent to the UKA office. If the dog is age two or over, the dog will only need one measurement. If there is controversy over a dog's measurement then an appointed UKA official shall re-measure the dog's height, which will be the determining measurement.

Dogs must be a minimum of 15 months of age at their first measurement.


UK Agility gives the handler the choice of jumping the dog higher than the jump height for which their dog is eligible.

Everyone should train their dogs to stand in a relaxed manner and allow a bar to rest on its shoulders. If your dog is tense, the measurement may be higher than it should be, and if it is impossible to measure your dog because it won't stand still, you won't be able to compete.


