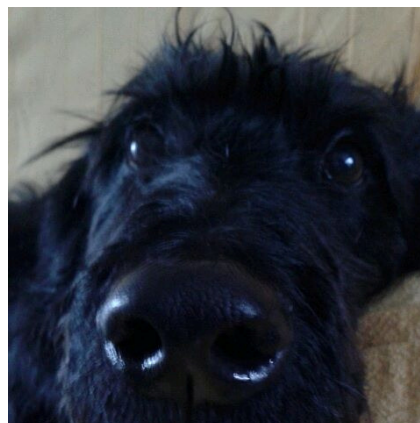

Agility report

We're back at Blewbury with a new class structure and your instructor will be encouraging you to consider what you'd like to achieve in 2014. Is it to enter your first show? Or get a clear round at a show? Or reach a final? Or go up a grade (or two)?

Then – when you have agreed this with your instructor – you should define 3 or 4 objectives to enable you to achieve your aim. This might be to get a reliable start-line wait enabling you to get to the second obstacle. Or improve your weaves so that your dog picks them up and completes them successfully 90% of the time. Or tighten up your turns to get faster times so that you get a top 5 place when you get a clear round. It will be easier for instructors to devise exercises to better suit those in their class when they know everyone's objectives.



If you are in the first sessions please get to Blewbury by 7.30pm to put the equipment out; leave your dogs in the car while you do this. Everyone in these sessions is expected to help. Anyone young and fit should be able and willing to help with the heavier equipment and if you have an injury, there are feet to put on jumps. Young juniors should remain in the arena and not go to the container.

Please take care with dogs in the kitchen area. Please don't bring dogs in too early before their class, and when dogs are coming out, please keep all dogs on a short lead. We used to have a one-way system, which I don't want to introduce in this wet weather, but will if there are any incidents.

You will be asked to complete a membership form and pay your annual subscriptions. The subs paid by new members who joined in or after October 2013 count for 2014 as well, so they just need to complete the form. We know completing the form is a bit of a pain, but it's only

once a year and we need to make sure we have your up-to-date information in case we need to contact you urgently.

The club isn't running a show this year, but we will be doing ring parties for other clubs when there are sufficient members attending, so do let us know when you are competing at KC shows. A notice will be at Blewbury regularly – or you can add your name to the 'Who's going to which shows' page on the Wiki. This also helps when we're trying to camp together. If you do well at any shows then you need to add these details to the Boast page on the Wiki.

You may now be wondering what the Wiki is. This is a private website for club members, which has some useful information. You need to be invited to enable you to visit this site – you need to contact Ian – the agility rep.

There is also a club facebook group – for members and a few close agility friends of the club. If you are on Facebook – search for WDC and then ask to be added.

The Watchdog editor (Alison) will be including more articles relevant to anyone wanting to start entering their first shows in future - the different organisations that run shows in this area and the types of shows, registering and measuring your dog, etc... If you need information in the meantime – do ask your instructor – or any member of club who competes that you can catch.

For everyone, it is now time to update the results sheet and if you would like to be included on the spreadsheet for 2014, you need to let me have the following information. Your name and pet name of dog, height/size of dog, and at what level you start the year competing.

Achievements and results (boasts) are accepted for any show you take part in, including things like the Winter League.

If you need help deciding, think you want to take part but don't know how, or not sure in which section you and your dog belong, please ask.

We have 4 sections

Junior – anyone under the age of 18 (no more than 3 dogs on which to record results)

Starter – anyone competing (or wishing to compete) at KC levels 1/2 or Beginner UKA

Novice – KC levels 3-5

Senior - KC Levels 6-7

You will stay in the same section you started in for the whole year – regardless of how much you may win! Good Luck everyone!

Olympia 2013

On Sunday 22nd December, at the traditional agility time of Stupid O'Clock, various Wallingford members assembled sleepily in car parks across Oxfordshire and Berkshire, and were gradually gathered into a coach to head towards London. We had a brief, enticing glimpse of the outside of Olympia, before we were spirited away to a coach park that we were not allowed to park in. Undaunted, we unloaded and began to walk...

The agility started at 9am, and we made it in time to settle into some good seats. Of the thousands of dogs who ran in the qualifiers during the year, we were down to just 36 dogs and handlers for the semi-final. As the handlers walked the course, we cheered encouragement!

Jenny Kimber & Guv (*below left*) just had 5 faults for the dogwalk contact, putting them 14th and through to the afternoon pairs final, while Carolyn & Ollie (*below right*) were unlucky with 10 faults (two poles) meaning they finished 25th and unfortunately did not get through.



The standard of competition was high – despite the nerves and the pressure there were hardly any eliminations (just four), which really shows only the best get to Olympia! The top ten who qualified for the evening final all had clear rounds, and in fact so did two of those who went through to the afternoon Pairs contest.

When the agility semi-final was over, the arena was then taken over by native pony showing – as far as I can make out this is similar to breed showing for dogs judged on shape, appearance, movement, without the animal having to DO anything. So we went shopping instead. The majority of stalls are horsey to a greater or lesser extent, but as horsey people wear boots, socks, gloves, hats, coats, etc, there are plenty of things that dog folks can buy too!

We found our proper seats in time for the afternoon performance starting, which began with a complicated knockout type of showjumping (over fences bigger than most people are tall), and the agility fell somewhere in the middle. Jenny and Guv were paired with experienced competitor Kathrin Tasker and her lurcher (with the brilliant name “Holy Moley”) and they ran well to finish 3rd. Well done, Jenny!

The rest of the performance included the hugely popular Shetland Pony Grand National, and ended with a visit from Father Christmas. The journey home took a slightly, erm, scenic route, through Slough of all places, but at least we were all dropped off at the correct car parks! Thank you Rosie for organising us all, and to everyone who made it a great club day out!

There was great excitement as each of the courses provided its own challenges – like the G3-7 jumping with the only large dog to go clear was Ozzie with Jenny – otherwise the smalls and mediums nearly took the clean sweep! Go the smalls and mediums!

Results – but remember they only place to 6th in large and 3rd in combined small/medium. Numbers in each class in brackets.

It is fascinating to see how handlers/dogs with faults or even with eliminations still managed to gain points for the Club, provided they have made a good effort to complete the course.

Gunner – 30 January 2000 – 10 November 2013

Gunner had a completely black head as a puppy. Kaye Faiers bred him and Sharon Rowe's Storme was his dad and he was the definition of the nutty collie – doing everything at 120%.

In his first summer one of his games was to race through the house – out through the patio doors – round the garden – back in through the kitchen door – then through the house and back out of the patio doors again. He mis-timed his dash through the patio doors once – catching his shoulder. He squealed and rolled head over heels into the garden.

He recovered OK – but over the next couple of weeks was lame on that leg, so the vets X-rayed his shoulder but could find nothing wrong. He was referred to an orthopaedic specialist at Burchetts Green. There they spotted a tiny piece of cartilage that had been chipped off the ball joint in his shoulder. This was OCD – or osteochondrosis of the shoulder – which is usually an inherited problem in large dogs, but can be a result of trauma (as in Gunner's case). They would normally recommend this is left, but knowing that I wanted to do agility, they suggested operating – which was very successful.

While he was recovering from the shoulder injury I decided to have a bash at Working Trials. Gunner was pretty good at searching and tracking (although laying the track is bloomin' hard work) and it kept me fit and Gunner mentally stimulated.

Jacky decided to train him for flyball – and he was quite awesome (like his dad Storme). He was completely focussed on getting the tennis ball and so could run in any position. In agility Gunner was just as focussed. He either left a trail of poles on the ground – keeping the ring party busy – or (more rarely) a spectacular clear round. He won out of both elementary and starters by over 6 seconds and reached Grade 5 – but I found him so frustrating that as soon as I had a second dog (Stig) I admit I stopped running him. However, Jenny Kimber gave him a new lease of life, running him with some success in his later years.

Although he was a very loving dog to humans, he was not an easy dog with the other dogs at home. He was a poor (possibly insecure) pack leader who kept control by intimidation - and injured Lazer, Dash, Stig and Dino before they learned to keep out of his way. But outside of the home he was better behaved and mixed well with other dogs.

Latterly he was suffering from painful hips, had a growing tumour under his tail and lost a lot of weight. He usually woke us 2 or 3 times a night but when that became 5 or 6 we decided that it was better to call it a day before the tumour destroyed his quality of life. We all miss him.

30th November – 1st December 2013

UK Agility run shows throughout the year, and at these show there are qualifiers for a number of competitions for which the finals take place at the end of the year at The Hand Arena in Clevedon near Bristol.

CSJ Grand Prix

This year Cass & I and Dinah & Cinders qualified for the CSJ UK Agility Grand Prix final. This is an Agility competition for all Novice, Senior & Champion dogs. All of the 20 finalists in each height ran in the semi final and then the top 10 went on to compete in the final later.

Dinah was unlucky in the semi final when an unusual burst of speed from Cinders caught Dinah out of position and they were eliminated. Cass did a fast round but was faulted for leaving the seesaw just before it hit the ground, but in 7th place we had got through to the final.

Unlike most agility competitions you have to run in strict running order and just as I entered the ring for my turn, I realised my nose was running... blood!

I didn't know what to do, but I needed to run then if I was going to, so off I went with my nose dripping blood! Despite this Cass was again brilliant & although I had allowed a very wide turn we were clear, and finished in 5th place (*right*).

Tug-e-Nuff Challenge

Wendy & Tatti and Gill R & Mindy qualified for the Tug-e-Nuff Challenge. This is a competition for Beginner and Novice dogs, combining the best overall performance in Jumping and Agility both in the qualifiers and also in the final.



At the final both Tatti & Mindy went clear in the jumping round with Mindy lying in 2nd place. In the Agility, Mindy was unfortunately drawn to the A frame instead of the long jump and was eliminated; Tatti was so keen to get to the finish line, at the penultimate obstacle, she collected 5 faults by coming out of the weaves early. This gave Tatti 4th place overall, absolutely brilliant especially as has overcome so many nervous problems to even get to the final.

Gio Gio qualified Bambi & Tatti for the Junior Open Championships. This competition involved both a jumping and an agility round. Tatti went clear in Jumping but despite Gio Gio's perseverance Tatti really didn't want to complete the weaves correctly, adding lots of time in the agility, and putting them out of the places. Bambi was eliminated in the Jumping (I didn't arrive early enough to see this one!) and just 5 faults in the Agility.

Wendy & Foxy qualified for the Beginners Steeplechase, a competition for beginners over a course of only jumps and tunnels. Well done for getting to the finals, but an elimination meant no place for Foxye.

2013 – One Amazing Year in Agility

This is the end of an amazing year for my lovely dogs; Mindy and Bertie, now both KC grade 5 and in May 2013 we were still grade 1. I would never have believed that they could both achieve so much in one year.

Bertie and Mindy have now both earned their KC silver and bronze agility warrants. Between them in 2013 they won; 47 x 1st places, 21 x 2nd, 24 x 3rd, 37 other place rosettes and 40 trophies. The photo below shows both dogs with the rosettes and trophies won in 2013 (although the DARL trophy is still to come!). Mindy and I qualified for and competed in both the UKA agility finals (Tug-e-nuff) and Agility Club Starters Challenge 2013. Mindy and I also qualified earlier in the year for the Agility Club Starters Challenge 2014.



Just over 3 years ago I fostered, and then adopted Mindy (then about 18mths old), who was rescued from the pound by Hope Rescue. I decided on the Kennel Club name of 'Hope's Messenger' as she was a message from Hope Rescue that all rescue dogs should have a second chance in life. Mindy is certainly proving that she deserved a second chance!

Bertie was my first agility dog. He is also a rescue, adopted at 1yr old, he is now almost 8, a typical cheeky, lively, mischievous terrier, very independent, stops to sniff at the most inopportune moments and likes to think he is in charge but he also loves agility and is very good when he wants to be! For Bertie to have come so far this year has really meant a lot to me.

I have just heard that Mindy and I achieved first place in the Medium Gold division of the Senior Agility League 2013 with 1607 points. The senior agility league is open to any handler over 55 and you compete in a different category depending on your age. If you wish to take part this year go to
