


WALLINGFORD DOG TRAINING CLUB November 2011

He arrived unexpectedly. I was working on a ring at Vyne when Leah dragged me off look at a puppy that needed rehoming. He was a beautiful 8 week old red merle tricolour BC puppy, we couldn't see any catch so we took him, it was the best decision we made. He was as good as gold when we got him home, not crying once. He came with a lead marked Tig, so we added an 'S' and he became Stig.



Stig grew into a strikingly handsome boy, he was very quick to learn and loved to work. At agility he quickly progressed to G7 and, win or lose, he was a joy to run. He didn't look very quick but the clock proved he was very economical and often won classes by a considerable margin. On a couple of occasions when I was injured Stig got a 2nd place with Jenny Kimber in G6 Jumping and a 1st and 2nd place in G6-7 with Anthony Clarke having never before worked with anyone but me.

Sadly by this time, aged three, he started having the occasional fit. He had a

season at G7 working well and winning a couple of G7 Agility classes despite my handling, but the frequency of fitting increased and after suffering ten fits one weekend he was put on a high dose of Epiphen. This had a serious effect on his ability to work, his judgement and concentration were not good but we hoped to reduce the medication and resume agility.

He was barely 5 years old when I got up for work on a Monday morning, let the dogs out and back in and went for a shower. On coming out of the shower it was a devastating shock and very sad to find Stig lying dead on the kitchen floor. He was a fantastic dog to live and work with and we still miss him, his unending desire to please and his amusing little habits. One that we miss is him playing with a toy in the living room, trying to get the attention of anyone watching TV. He'd pick up a toy, shaking it vigorously before letting it go at full swing. He'd watch where it landed and look back at you, all intent eyes and gorgeous prick ears, snap his teeth with a little 'woof' as if to say 'Well, what do you think of that one?' If he was ignored he would retrieve the toy and try again. Thank You Leah. Ian.

Since starting on the 'agility circuit' Frank had some great successes with Jess and was thoroughly enjoying attending shows and winning rosettes and trophies. Frank joined the club earlier this year, training Jess in the Medium class. His wife, Zillah, brought their collie, Nell (sister of Jess), to join the Foundation class with the latest intake of new dogs in early summer. Both dogs and handlers were doing well in their respective classes. Gill Kimber writes as Frank's trainer, 'I'd just like to say that Frank always listened very attentively and was keen to learn. Training initially started off gently with the children running around the field and guiding a human "dog" around the course. Then we let the real canines out! This is a community message from Thames Valley Police update.

The silver Golf that was involved in the theft of dogs from the Letcombe Bassett area of Wantage and also several other thefts and suspicious incidents across the Vale and South Oxfordshire has been found abandoned in Leatherhead in Surrey on Tuesday evening. Forensic examination of the car is taking place and police are following up on information about numerous offences connected to this car.

Occupants of a grey (almost green) Jeep Cherokee have been involved in almost identical suspicious incidents across Berkshire and Oxfordshire over the last two days including when disturbed saying they are looking for their lost dog. They may be connected to the silver Golf. The part index of the Jeep is R658 - please report any sightings immediately to the police on 08458 505 505 or please use 999 if you think a crime is being committed.
